Criminal Law

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<u>Course Materials</u>: The required textbook for this class is *Criminal Law: Concepts and Practice* (4^{th} edition) , authored by Podgor, Henning, Garcia & Jones.² Supplemental course materials will be posted on MyWCL throughout the semester.

<u>The Ground Rules</u>: Class will be taught using a combination of the Socratic method, lecture, and in-class student presentations. You must select a seat for the semester, sign the seating chart, and use that seat for the remainder of the semester. You will also be given a tent card to use throughout the semester. Please have the tent card clearly displayed at the start of each class. Class attendance will be taken, and attendance is mandatory. If you miss an excessive number of classes you may not be eligible to receive credit for the course and you will not be permitted to take the final exam. Therefore, if circumstances arise (e.g., medical, family emergency) that will cause you to miss two or more successive classes you must inform the Dean of Students Office immediately. PLEASE <u>do not</u> contact me each time you miss a single class.

<u>Class Participation</u>: Active class participation is required. During each class I will randomly call on students to answer hypothetical questions and discuss assigned reading material. It is critical that you bring the textbook and come prepared for every class. If you are not prepared you can use a "no pressure" pass and volunteer the following class. You will be eligible to receive a step increase in your final grade if you: (1) report to class regularly; (2) are consistently prepared when called on; (3) make (in my subjective opinion) a substantial (quality, not quantity) contribution to the class discussion that demonstrates your mastery of the legal analysis; and (4) perform well on the assigned oral advocacy exercises. Conversely, if you miss multiple classes and are repeatedly unprepared when called on in class your final grade for the course may be lowered by one step.

<u>Class Recording</u>: As a matter of policy--except for make-up classes and *extreme emergencies*—I will not record classes and you may not make a recording of any class without my express
